

HISTORICAL MARKERS.

On January 1, 1916, Brown played Washington State in the second Rose Bowl Game. This game started what would be a foundational history for Ivy League participation during the early stages of the Rose Bowl. An Ivy League school played in three of the first six Rose Bowl Games. One of those teams, Brown, also had the first African-American, Fritz Pollard, to participate in the Rose Bowl.

Although the Rose Bowl Game is often associated with other conferences, the lvy League and its rich traditional history set the foundation of what the Rose Bowl Game is today.

The Rose Bowl Stadium will honor the rich Ivy League history at the Rose Bowl with an in-stadium historical marker. Here are just some of the historically significant facts:

- The first African-American to play at the Rose Bowl, Fritz Pollard, played for Brown
- Led by Head Coach Bob Folwell and three sport star Howard Berry, Penn beat Penn State, Michigan and West Virginia during the regular season on their way to the Rose Bowl Game
- · Harvard beat Oregon 7-6 in the first Rose Bowl after WWI. Harvard finished the season 8-0-1
- Under Head Coach Lou Little, Columbia, beat heavily-favored Stanford 7-0 in one of the biggest upsets in Rose Bowl Game history.


